A Tribute to Vermont.

In welcoming Governor Coolidge to the executive chair in Massachusetts, the Boston Herald pays a handsome tribute to Vermont as well as to New Hampshire, declaring: "From the north country, we have had so steady an influx of solid men that the inauguration of a native Vermonter again occasions no surprise."

Vermont to Give \$60,000.

An urgent appeal is again to be made to the generosity of Vermonters. Almost untold thousands of people are suffering the pangs of cold and hunger in nearly every country of the Near East—Armenia, Syria, Greece and other countries—as a result of the world war.

This campaign is endorsed by President Wilson, who urges the people of America to be generous in their aid to suffering humanity in the Near East. It is estimated that 4,000,000 Armenians, Syrian, Greek and other sufferers require immediate help.

VERMONT NOTES.

Ralph Denio, 45, a prominent business man of Bristol, died January 2 of influenza. He had been superintendent of the Bristol railroad for about 20 years and was president of the Bristol National bank.

Three popular young people of Wardsboro have died since Christmas with pneumonia, following influenza. They were Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Coleman, proprietors of the hotel, for whom a double funeral was held, and the postmaster, Perley Kidder.

Despite wide publicity given to the removal of the office of Federal Food Administrator F. H. Brooks from Montpelier to St. Johnsbury, mail continues to be addressed to Montpelier. Therefore, the food administrator requests the public to bear the change in mind when they are addressing his office.

Attorney Robert C. Bacon, 44, a member of the law firm of Bacon, Harvey & Whitney, and for nearly six years previous to November, chairman of the Vermont Public Service Commission died of double pneumonia January 7 in Brattleboro.

The largest freshman class that has ever entered the University of Vermont registered January 2 and others who could not come because of illness telephoned in that they would come later.

A bill introduced in the senate by Senator Dillingham of Vermont provides that "the secretary of war be directed to deliver to the state of Vermont 25 cannon from the guns captured by the American expeditionary forces or delivered to the United States by the treaty of peace together with a suitable complement of cannon balls, projectiles or shells, for exhibition purposes."

After serving five years of a sentence of 13 years for manslaughter, Lou A. Foster of West Halifax was released from the state prison in Windsor, Vermont, by Governor Horace F. Graham, and is now in Iowa. Foster was pardoned Nov. 27, but no publicity was made of the fact and the news was not known until Monday.

Chief Forester W. G. Hastings of Vermont announces that the state has purchased through the state forestry department about 6,000 acres of wild land near Lanesboro on the Montpelier & Wells River railroad, known as the Goslett tract.

Frank C. French of Poultney, has brought suit to recover \$12,000 from the Norton Hardware company of Fair Haven on the ground of negligence in failure to promptly label poison sold to the plaintiff.

The shortage of competent Babcock test operators in Vermont is extreme. Several cow test associations have been disbanded for their lack of operators and are available for new associations.

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CLAIMS VOUCHERS REMOVED
