## News and Views from this Hustling Village

### The Orleans Junior Red Cross

The Orleans high and graded schools are to be complimented on their Junior Red Cross. It is the only school of its type in the county to have such an organization. During the week of the regular Red Cross drive, the pupils put on an active campaign for Junior membership. A team of six pupils, a member of the Senior Red Cross, and the principal visited each of the grades in the school to present the past, present and future work of such an organization. Especially those phases of health betterment for the young people in the community was discussed. The result of this campaign was that before the end of the week the school had a 100% enrollment. The second, third and sixth grades, and the classes of 1920, 1921 and 1923 of the high school went over the top without any outside assistance. Three ladies in the village, Miss Ella Blaisdell, Mrs. Alice Wheeler and Mrs. M. M. Taplin, added small contributions to the school fund.

The pupils elected a committee to cooperate with the advisory committee of the faculty. The following pupils were elected: Miss Gertrude Heath, chairman; Miss Florence Hardy, secretary and treasurer; Misses Mabel Bennett, and Dorothy Porter, and Messrs. Lindol French and Lynn White. This committee has organized the plans for the year.

The scope of this organization is broader than many people realize. It cooperates with various branches of the Red Cross and with other organizations. In cooperation with the Home Service of the local branch surgical attention is given defective school children. Several operations have been performed on adenoids and defective tonsils. A part-time school nurse has been secured to visit the homes to help improve inadequate childhood conditions.

In cooperation with the board of education each pupil is given a medical examination semi-yearly. The results are sent into the homes of the pupils. Duplicate records are kept on file in the principal's office. Plans have also been made to further the recreational activities of the pupils by getting the skating rink and the toboggan slide in good order. These have not been available in the degree wished for earlier in the season, due to several unavoidable causes.

The Junior Red Cross has full charge of the management of the hot noon lunches served by the school. Arrangements have been made to provide these warm lunches for the children otherwise unable to enjoy them.

Flowers have been sent into the homes of pupils with a deceased parent. Toys were collected by the pupils at Christmas time for distribution among the less fortunate children of the village. A sum of money has been sent to the destitute children in foreign lands. The latest plans are those being made to detect cases of malnutrition among the pupils and remedy the underlying causes.
