SAYS HEALTH OFFICER

Dr. Joe W. Jackson Says He Thinks There Were Several Not Reported in Month of November—Vital Statistics.

In preparing the vital statistics of the city for the month of November, the city health officer, Dr. Joe W. Jackson, has found that some births, probably three, have not been reported, as the city ordinances require.

Section 3 says that a physician or other person fails to make the required return, or makes an incomplete, incorrect or unseasonable return, he shall forfeit all compensation therefor, and be liable to the penalty prescribed in section five.
