Public Consistory Is Held at the Vatican.

Rome, May 29.—The public consistory at the Vatican, at which the red hat was conferred on those now in Rome of the 13 new cardinals created on Monday, was held yesterday. It was attended by several thousand persons, most of whom were Americans and other foreigners. A

special mission will be sent to take the berretas to the absent cardinals. In the passage of the pontiff to and from the consistory he was surrounded and followed by many ecclesiastic, military and civil dignitaries. After the consistory, the cardinals, both old and new, gathered in the Sixtine chapel to return thanks, and then met, presided over by the pope, in the consistorial hall, where Pius X. bestowed the cardinal's ring, granted them the privileges of their position and named their titular churches.

**TOUR OF FIELD DUTY IN MASS.**

National Guard of Vermont Is to Go to Massachusetts

FOR FIRST TIME IN HISTORY

Will Receive Instruction at Lakeville from Infantry from Plattsburg

Boston, May 29.—For the first time in the history of the Bay State, National Guard troops from Maine and Vermont will spend their tour of field duty here. Following the tour of duty of the first and second Massachusetts brigades at Lakeville, the troops from Maine and Vermont will mobilize there. A battalion from the fifth United States Infantry from Plattsburg barracks, N. Y., will be sent to Lakeville to give instruction to the troops from this state, Maine and Vermont.

The camp at Lakeville will be more a camp of instruction than for manueuvres, though it is probable there will be simple manueuvres during the tour of duty. It is planned to hold a close inspection of every command on the field, when shortages in uniforms or equipment will be turned up. The inspection and instruction will be determined by General Sweetser of the second Massachusetts brigade and Major John W. Heavey, U. S. A.

As in former years the battalion of field artillery will camp at West Barnstable, where there is ample room for projectile practice. The squadron of cavalry will camp at Pomfret, Conn., where it will join the mounted men from Connecticut and Rhode Island. Here again is a radical change, since this is the first time that such troops have done a tour of camp duty outside the state.

**GOES TO JAIL.**

St. Denis Will There Await Trial on Murder Charge.

Manchester, N. H., May 29.—John Omer St. Denis, alleged to have shot and killed his wife Tuesday afternoon, was arraigned in police court yesterday before Judge Center, charged with murder.

The proceedings were little more than a formality and occupied but three minutes. Through his counsel, St. Denis pleaded not guilty and waived a reading of the complaint and examination.

He was committed to the county jail without bail to await the sitting of the September term of the superior court.

**DILLINGHAM URGES WATER DEVELOPMENT**

In Address at St. Albans He Described Vast Possibilities of Water in Place of Coal.

St. Albans, May 29.—Senator William P. Dillingham was the guest of honor at a "get-together" supper at the First Congregational chapel last night, and delivered an address on immigration, and the concentration of population in cities. He spoke of the trend of recent immigration to the larger centers of population and of the concentration of manufacturing in such centers, but said that this tendency cannot continue indefinitely. After discussing the changed character of immigration in recent years, and the part immigrant labor has played in the development of industry in the United States, he said in substance:

Already representatives of great interest are looking about the country for favorable manufacturing locations and in the near future capital will find it advantageous to plant industries in the rural sections where labor conditions will be better, and where abundant water power will lower the cost of production. In recent years much attention has been given to the development of water power, and authorities agree that 30,000,000 of electrical horse power can be developed by the proper conservation of the streams in the United States. Authorities also state that one horse power equals five tons of coal per annum, and if this be so our streams, if adequately developed and the water properly conserved, would relieve industry from the purchase of 150,000,000 tons of coal annually.

The annual cost of fuel and power used in the manufactures of New England alone is approximately \$50,000,000, and if that amount could be saved for a period of eight years the total would equal the cost of the Panama canal. Massachusetts alone pays \$26,000,000 annually for fuel and power and if that could be saved for 15 years the state could well afford to pay for the canal.

It has been estimated by engineering experts that if the waters of Vermont are properly conserved they are capable of developing 2,000,000 electrical horsepower. According to the last United States census of manufactures, the value of manufactured products equaled \$1,152 per horsepower installed, while the yearly wages paid amounted to \$248 per horsepower. Reduce the possible electrical power that might be developed from Vermont streams to 1,000,000 of horsepower, instead of the estimated 2,000,000, and it is found, according to the census reckoning, that such power would give employment to men and women earning \$248,000,000, or 14 times as much as at present, while there could be produced from its use manufactured goods valued at \$1,152,000,000, or about 16 1/2 times the value of our present product.

Prior to 1910 no government or state expert had ever reported upon the undeveloped power in the Deerfield river, and yet men of cautious judgment have ventured to expend \$1,000,000 in constructing a reservoir at the head of that stream which stores all of the water from 40 square miles of surrounding territory. This reservoir, it is said, is capable of storing 2,500,000,000 cubic feet of water. The minimum flow of the Deerfield river in dry seasons is only 10 cubic feet per second, and without storage that measures the value of the stream for power purposes. With storage, it is said, the minimum flow of the stream will be raised to 300 cubic feet per second, and therefore its power will be increased 30 fold.

If the conservation of this stream results in the development of 100,000 electrical horsepower, it will be equivalent to having a coal mine in Windham county producing annually 500,000 tons of coal, which product if valued at \$4 per ton would amount to \$2,000,000 annually. Moreover, the utilization of this power on the basis referred to would yield \$24,000,000 in wages, and produce goods to the value of \$115,000,000.

If the streams of Vermont can be made to produce 2,000,000 electrical horsepower, as estimated, they will be as valuable as coal mines producing 10,000,000 tons of fuel, which at \$5 a ton would be equal in value to all the fuel now used for manufacturing purposes in New England.

Other states are adopting measures to conserve their natural resources. Pennsylvania taxes coal mined in that state for use in other states. Oklahoma has attempted by legislation to prevent the shipment of oil beyond her borders, and Maine and New Hampshire are trying to preserve their water power for home use. Vermont has already attempted to provide for the demands of her own people before permitting the transmission of power to other states, but in view of the tremendous possibilities it would seem that the state ought to make a thorough study of the problem and adopt a policy of development which will bring within her borders those great industries which are seeking locations where power is available at reasonable cost, and where because of the reign of law and order business may be peaceably conducted.

Such a scheme of development would have its legal problem because of the riparian rights of mill site owners, but it has been suggested that the state might assume the cost and maintenance of reservoirs at the head of streams on a contract basis with the owners of mill sites as to the price which should be paid by such owners for improved facilities, and so work out a system through which all the water power within our borders can be utilized.

It has been suggested, also, that this is a scheme in which the general government not only has a great interest but in the development of which it ought to have a part, inasmuch as the storage of water will result in an increased flow of navigable streams over which the federal government has sole jurisdiction. Under the Appalachian forest reserve act more than \$700,000 has been appropriated for the purchase and preservation of forests in New Hampshire, which expenditure would be wholly unconstitutional were it not for the claim that through the preservation of these forests the flow of the Connecticut river and other navigable streams will be increased, and the advantages of navigation greatly enhanced. If the general government can afford to make such vast expenditures in the purchase of forest lands for the purpose indicated, it ought to make even greater ones, by loan or otherwise, for the establishment of storage reservoirs. The one reservoir on the Deerfield river will do more for the navigation of the Connecticut below Holyoke than all the forest reserves which the government contemplates in the White mountains, and what is true of the West river and also true of the West river and to a greater or less degree of all other streams in the state. The increase of the minimum flow by 300 cubic feet per second in 20 streams would be 6,000 cubic feet per second, which probably would be more than double the minimum flow of the Connecticut river at Turners Falls and Holyoke.
