### TESTING ARIZONA'S LAWS

Suits on Prohibition and Alien Labor Brought Before Federal Judge.

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 22.—Suits to enjoin enforcement of the Arizona prohibition and alien labor laws were brought up here yesterday before the United States judge, Wiley E. Jones.

Attorney general of Arizona, principal defendant in the prohibition injunction case, said he would propose to limit arguments on both sides in four hours so that the case might be decided and those interested return home for Christmas.

There are four petitions for the prohibition injunction. One of these is in the name of Rev. Thomas Connolly, pastor of All Saints Catholic church of Tucson, Ariz.

The anti-alien labor law, adopted with the prohibition constitutional amendment on Nov. 3, provides that four out of five workers employed in any business shall be citizens of the United States.

Mystery Woman in Bell Murder.

New York, Dec. 22.—Charges furnished by a woman yesterday may result in the indictment of the slayers of Herbert Bell, postman. District Attorney Whitman took personal charge of the grand jury that took up the case and expects to present evidence resulting in the indictment of two or more men some winter month.

The woman defendant is said to be seeking revenge. She will be the first witness called before the grand jury.

The federal authorities will join in the prosecution.
