DEATH IN THE MOUNTAINS.

THE DEADLY FLAYER WHICH A SEVERE FROST HAS CAUSED IN WESTERN VIRGINIA AND KENTUCKY.

A dispatch from Hinton, West Virginia, under date of Nov. 29 says: New rumors of the plague in the mountain district in the county of Dickenson, county of Virginia, in the middle of the Cumberland mountains, and over 100 miles from the nearest railway station. The ground is covered with ice and the cold weather is now to cause such a mortality as even the present state of affairs may be liable to equal. The last rainfall was on August 3, since it has fallen within a week. The last person arriving here from that section was a commercial traveler for a Baltimore house, who left on a week ago yesterday. He says business was at a standstill. Crops are a failure. Many families have a barrel of grain under a head of ice which has melted. Medicines are exhausted, and physicians are nearly all dead from over-exertion. Crops have been destroyed, and many instances water is carried three or four miles in buckets. There is no running water. Cattle have been starved to death in pools in the deeper holes in creek bottoms. Louisiana has not sufficient water in it to float a ship, says a pool. The fish are dead by the millions. It is feared that the water is not safe to drink. It is reported that the water carried by the mountain people is not safe to drink.
