Ho Hum! Fuzzy Hits Another '700' Series

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif. Nov. 26 (Nichi Bei Times Dispatch)—For the first time in the entire history of bowling in San Francisco a record was set by a Nisei when Fuzzy Shimada hit his second successive 700-plus series last Wednesday night in the Downtown Invitational league.

Rolling games of 244, 254 and 203, Shimada amassed a 701 total to add to the 768 series he hit the week before.

No bowler is now even near his record of four 700 series in eight weeks of bowling and the same goes for his league average which is 202.

Shimada's four 700-plus series, including two others of 706 and 703, now give him a 2878 total or a 720

series average and a 239 average for 12 games.

VETERANS STILL CAN CONVERT THEIR TERM GI INSURANCE
World War II veterans who hold 5-year or 8-year GI term life insurance still may convert to permanent plans of GI insurance with guaranteed values that term policies do not have, it has been announced by the Veterans Administration.

The VA said no law has been passed by the Congress which takes away or otherwise limits the right of World War II veterans to convert from term to permanent plans of National Service Life Insurance.

The only GI life insurance which may not be converted under present laws is the special 5-year nonconvertible term policy that is issuable to veterans with service since the start of Korean hostilities.

Nearly five million NSLI term policies now in force, with a face value of over 38 billion dollars, may be converted to one or more of the six permanent plans of NSLI, the VA said. These plans are ordinary life, 20-pay life, 30-pay life, and three endowment plans. The policies may be converted upon application to the VA at an time before the term periods expire.

Other millions of NSLI term policies, which have been permitted to lapse for non-payment of premiums when due, also may be reinstated and converted upon application to the VA before their terms expire.

The VA pointed out there are distinctive differences between term and permanent plan NSLI policies. Term policies provide only coverage against death. Moreover, if veterans wish to retain this type of insurance, they must renew their policies every 5 years at progressively higher premium rates, based on the attained age at time of renewal.

Permanent plan policies, on the other hand, are payable at the same rate throughout the premium-paying life of the policies, and they have guaranteed values which term policies do not. These guaranteed values, which are available after premiums have been paid for one full year, include cash surrender value, policy loans, extended term insurance and reduced paid-up insurance.

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
