DUMBA EVADES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 20.—State department officials said today that the letter of Austrian Ambassador Dumba, in which he publicly denied the moral right of the U. S. government to demand his recall, contained only a part of the truth. Dumba defended at length his right to inform Austro-Hungarians that they were disobeying old-world laws in working in munitions plants. But, it was pointed out, he evaded altogether the offenses of sending messages by a man traveling under American passport, and the plan to spend money in a campaign to close up American industries.

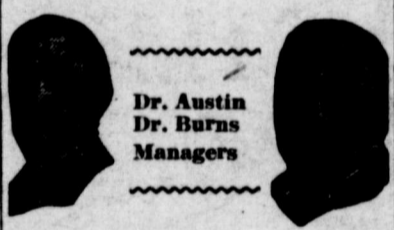
W. C. T. U. HEAD SPEAKS TWICE

LONDON, Sept. 20.—David Lloyd-George today made public a letter to a constituent which, it is believed, is intended to prepare the public mind for a conscription act. The minister of munitions

frankly stated that the subject of conscription was under serious consideration, and that the nation must take cheerfully whatever decision should be reached. Lloyd-George declared the country faced the most serious crisis in its history.
