INFLUENCE OF THE SCHOLAR.

Some Observations in Connection with the Death of Professor Dwight.

The recent death of Professor Theodore William Dwight, of Columbia law school, has given rise to some fresh discussion of the question as to how far college men and great scholars are qualified to organize or lead great movements, whether in law or politics, religion or society.

From time immemorial there has been a sort of dull feud between the quiet scholar and the active politician, "Theorists," "bookworms," "closet philosophers"—such are the epithets the latter bestow on the former.

Professor William G. Sumner, of Yale college, wrote a little work on "American Currency" some seventeen years ago which revolutionized the views of many, and his subsequent articles on finance in general have had considerable effect.

Charles Sumner entered public life avowedly as an advocate of applying scholarly methods to all public issues, and Wendell Phillips, James Freeman Clarke, James Russell Lowell and many others of that era were brilliant examples of "the scholar in politics."

So early was the fact recognized in the south and west that Edward Everett, the most conservative of scholars, was then popularly supposed to be a radical abolitionist even down to the time when the Bell and Everett campaign began.

A DAUGHTER OF TEXAS.
