NEWS OF THE BADGER STATE

Eau Claire—Harold, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Dahl, living near here, fell from a pier in the Eau Claire river and was drowned. Two little boys who were near saw him fall into the water and in their fright each promised the other that he would say nothing about it lest it might be thought that they pushed him in. However, one of the boys could not sleep and finally, about midnight, got up, woke his parents and told them about it. They in turn notified the Dahl family. The body was found near where the lad fell in.

Madison—The railroad commission handed down a decision and order upon the petition of the Wisconsin-Minnesota Co. filed July 21, 1919, asking for an adjustment of gas rates in the city of Chippewa Falls. It authorizes the petitioner to put in effect a new schedule of gas rates 25 cents per thousand cubic feet in excess of the rate now in effect and which has been in force for more than a year. The increase asked by the company was 90 cents per thousand cubic feet.

La Crosse—Maintaining that even a motorcycle cop is entitled to a night's rest, now and then, the common council adopted a resolution providing for a night police officer to pursue speeders. The motorcycle cop is the only officer in the city government who makes his own salary and shows a handsome dividend for the municipality each month. Fines paid by speeders reach a tidy sum during the spring, summer and autumn months, police court records show.

Sturgeon Bay—From present indications it is rather doubtful whether or not Sturgeon Bay will have a national guard company. Maj. M. D. Imhoff was here trying to line up enough men to form a company. While a number of young men have signed up, the majority of them got enough of the army during the war. If the company is organized Capt. G. M. Stapleton will be in command.

Appleton—Contrary to the custom of rotating its offices, Group 3, Wisconsin Bankers' association re-elected L. Albert Karel of Kewaunee as president and J. L. Stone of Ripon as vice president. L. W. Metzner, Casco, was made secretary-treasurer, and H. E. Stedman, Sturgeon Bay, and A. J. Whitford, Marinette, were named members of the executive board.

La Crosse—Overruling objections to the extradition of A. M. Castle, head of the defunct A. M. Castle Engineering Co., who was brought to La Crosse on charges of obtaining money under false pretenses, the county court released and set the preliminary hearing.

Madison—The division of markets reports that shipments of Wisconsin potatoes have dwindled to as low as seven cars a day. That figure is in contrast to the shipments during the heavy movement when, on several days in October, more than 200 cars per day were shipped. The largest day's shipment for the season was 259 cars on Oct. 23, 1919. There will be scattering shipments from now on until after planting is over, when the final windup of the season will show the total shipments to be approximately 17,500 cars.

Janesville—Farmers of Rock county are starting to see rays of light in the serious farm hand shortage. A large number of laborers have applied for and received jobs on farms, mostly all single men. The sudden shift in the situation is said to be due to the housing shortage and the high rents and living costs prevailing in the city, which men experienced with farm work do not want to pay. However, the condition is still a bad one as the demand for farm help is 6 per cent more than normal.

Oconomowoc—Mrs. Etta Kavarsky, 36, patient for several weeks at Waldheim Park sanatorium, was found hanging. She had brooded over the death of her brother, Simon Polkan, 14, who was shot last fall by a playmate while they were playing in the Polkan home. Her husband, living at Hancock, Mich., and five children remain. Mrs. Kavarsky's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Polkan, came here a year ago from Milwaukee, where they are well known.

Eau Claire—Miss Evelyn Wylie, Miss Rachel Phillips, L. H. Wylie and Clarence Larson, normal school students, essayed the dangerous feat of changing seats in a canoe in the middle of Half Moon lake here, with the not infrequent result that the craft capsized. Y. Brown, boat keeper's son, rowed to the scene and just managed to get the girls as one, exhausted, let go of the overturned canoe. The boys were saved by another boat.

Two Rivers—One of the five cavalry troops being organized in Wisconsin will have its quarters at Two Rivers. Picnic Hill, which has been the recreation and beauty spot of the city, has been taken over by the state for a period of years and will be used for the home and drill grounds for the newly formed cavalry troop. Seventy-five men will be the required quota and the necessary enlistments have already been completed.

Sheboygan—Five young men, Frank Czaja, Edward Bayens, Christ Horst, John Fischer and A. Schuette miraculously escaped death when the Studebaker car, owned and driven by Czaja, plunged over an embankment and into the Sheboygan river at the Ashby bridge on the Lower Falls rd. The boys extricated themselves from the automobile and swam to safety, coming out without a scratch.

Manitowoc—The Pauly & Pauly Cheese Co. of this city will invade the state of Michigan, to handle poultry, cheese and cheese factory equipment. The company has filed an amendment to its incorporation papers. A branch house has already been opened at Escanaba, Mich. Pauly & Pauly operate a string of cheese warehouses throughout Wisconsin, with headquarters here.

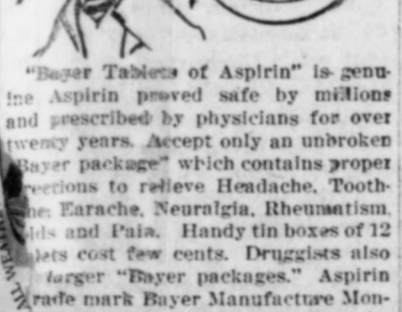
