The Postage on Country Papers.
 We find a savage growl in the New
 York Tribune of the 17th inst, from
 which we extract the following:
 "Of all pitiful pleas for taking money
 out of the Treasury, that set up by a few
 super-servicable champions of the coun-
 try press in Congress, is the paltriest.—
 We refuse to believe that the country
 press chooses to place itself in the atti-
 tude of a beggar before Congress."
 * * * We demand that the business
 of carrying the mails shall be conducted
 like any other, on business principles;
 that a fair price shall be paid for fair
 work, no more and no less."
 Oh, you do, eh? Well now suppose
 you pay "a fair price," what it costs, to
 bring the great, heavy, weekly Tribune
 a thousand miles here to Wisconsin, and
 the country press will pay just what it
 costs to carry their issues in the county
 where published. How much is this
 sum? Let us put Senator Morton on the
 stand and here what he says about it.—
 In a speech lately delivered in the Sen-
 ate, he says:
 "One more word, sir. It does not cost
 this Government \$1,000 a year, as I am
 advised by one who is well acquainted
 with the subject, to carry newspapers
 and distribute them in the counties where
 they are published. The small mails are
 not carried by weight but by the mile,
 so much for the route. The question of
 weight does not enter into the cost of a
 country mail. It does enter into the cost
 of a great mail from New York to
 San Francisco; but in a little mail car-
 ried throughout the country the question
 of weight does not enter into considera-
 tion. Therefore, it adds nothing to the
 expense of the Post-office Department to
 carry these newspapers free throughout
 the county of publication."
 But this is not a mere question of
 dollars and cents. The repeal of the
 law a lowering country papers to pass free
 through the mail is a blow aimed at the
 local papers, and we tell the Tribune and
 the members of Congress that these pa-
 pers will strike back. Has the Tribune
 abandoned the protective policy; is it
 no longer in favor of home manufactures?
 —State Journal.
