

Surrender of Juarez Demanded by Rebels

Formal Demand Served on General Navarro, Federal Commander of Fortifications—Refusal to Mean Battle.

EL PASO, Texas, April 19.—A formal demand was made to-night upon General John Navarro for the surrender of Juarez to the insurrecto army of Francisco I. Madero Jr. within 24 hours.

This was confirmed by Gonzales Garza, secretary general for the insurrecto party, who said:

"Formal demand of the insurrectos for the surrender of Juarez within 24 hours has been made on General Navarro, commanding the Federal garrison of Juarez. The note was sent from El Paso by messenger to United States Consul Edwards in Juarez, to be transmitted by him to Navarro. No reply has been received."

"I have received no notice asking me to surrender." He turned on his heel.

"But, General, the insurrectos' secretary says the demand has been made."

"I have received no such message," he replied, and walked away.

Garza was still in his office to-night at 8:30. He said he did not think he would leave El Paso to-night to see Madero.

"Our men are anxious for a fight, and I do not know if we can restrain them," he declared.

Madero Marching on Juarez.

INSURRECTO CAMP, TOWN OF MADERO, CHIHUAHUA, Mexico, April 19.—Francisco I. Madero, Jr., is marching on the City of Juarez at the head of 1,940 insurgents, divided into five columns, one under the direct command of Madero, and the others under the rebel Generals Orozco, Blanco, Villa and Salazar.

The Wounded Put to Death Heavy Losses In Big Fight

Mexicans and Rebels Both Follow Practice, Is Grave Charge.

PEACE IN SIGHT, SAYS AMBASSADOR.

American Minister Gives Assurance That Border Fights Are at End.

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Developments late today indicated to President Taft and other administration officials that peace in Mexico may not be a dream, and there is reason to believe that the Mexican authorities will adopt a "definite, restrictive policy along the border, to prevent border conflicts.

Senor Manuel De Zamacoena, the new ambassador from Mexico, was sent to the president, and declarations of friendship were exchanged.

Information was given out at the White House that the rough draft of Mexico's formal note in reply to the state department's demand that American border towns be not endangered by Mexican battles, has been placed in the hands of American Ambassador Wilson at Mexico City.

House to Investigate. A sub-committee of the house committee on Foreign Affairs will meet at the White House tomorrow to confer on the Mexican situation.

Delegation Ralph Cameron, of Arizona, announced that he had received a letter from a business man at Douglas declaring that Mexicans, both federal and insurrecto, who were wounded at Agua Prieta, were being put to death by the victors.

In a formal speech to the president, Senor Zamacoena said peace would be declared in Mexico shortly. The president, in a sentence or two not included in his formal address, assured the new ambassador that this government was not encroaching on the border ready to spring upon Mexico.

RATIFY INCOME TAX. New York Takes Favorable Action On Federal Provision. ALBANY, N. Y., April 19.—After a long debate the senate today passed the Wagner resolution, ratifying the proposed income tax amendment to the federal constitution by a vote of 24 to 16.

May Drop Camorra Prosecution

Informer May Be Accomplish and New Inquiry Will Be Necessary.

VITERBO, Italy, April 19.—The trial of the Neapolitan Camorristas may be halted and a new investigation into the murder of Genaro Coscicola and his wife ordered on the ground that the informer, Genaro Abatemaggio, was an accomplice in the crime.

This possibility rests on the truth of a sensational report circulated on the resumption of the case today. The report is to the effect that if the evidence already prepared by the state appears insufficient to convict the accused, Abatemaggio will confess complicity in the assassination of Coscicola. It is said that he will swear that while he was not one of those who struck the death blow, he witnessed the proceedings in the role of a picker who was posted to warn the actual assassins against interruption and to help them in making their escape.

If this confession is made the trial will be stopped, as a new inquiry into the facts of the crime will be necessary.
