

WILL MAKE POTATO TESTS ON PENITENTIARY FARM

EXPERIMENTAL STATION BEGINS MOVEMENT.

Experiments Will Probably Prove of Great Benefit to the Farmers of This State.

Having reached an agreement with the Board of Control and the warden of the penitentiary, the directors of the West Virginia Experimental Station will this summer make all their tests on the penitentiary farm, twelve miles south of this city. Director Stewart, in a letter to the penal warden, announces that the directors will within a short time move a large quantity of their material to Moundsville to start spraying potatoes and making various forms of fertilizer tests.

By making these tests on the penitentiary farm the directors of the experimental station will have an ample opportunity of carefully studying the tests which will through time prove of great benefit to the farmers and fruit growers of this State. Already the demonstrating work in spraying the orchards by the directors of the station is producing results. In Monongalia county more than 100 spraying pumps have been purchased during the past few weeks, while in Ohio county nearly this number have been purchased. Not only are these sprays good for fruit trees, but they have proven of great benefit to the shade trees on which they are being used here. Hundreds have been sold throughout the fruit raising section of the State, and the movement for better fruit culture has spread throughout the Ohio Valley and the eastern Panhandle as finding these sprays of great use.

Orchard tests of spraying, pruning and planting trees in this vicinity and in the Potomac Valley are being conducted by Professor A. L. Dacey and Professor J. E. Flor, who will be glad to give any information to local fruit growers or persons interested in the new systems. This information can be obtained by writing to the station at Morgantown. Persons who are living in this immediate vicinity can see the experiments being made at the penitentiary farm.

General On Call for An Extra Session of the State Legislature.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., April 19.—There has been little comment about the capitol building over the extra session call, due to the belief prevalent for six weeks that the governor would do as he said he would unless he could be convinced that the legislators would not pass a primary election law. There has been some speculation, however, as to what he would do in the call, and his action in this respect as it would be in any other, is being criticized and commended, according to the fancy of the speaker.

The thing that is most frequently asked, is: How long will the session last? "Since a session has been called, I hope it will pass a good primary election law," said a prominent politician who has heretofore declined to state whether in his opinion the governor should convene the legislators in special session. "I have always been in favor of a primary and we certainly need something that will be an improvement over what we have, and I have implicit confidence in the ability of Governor Glasscock to see the needs of the time."

As to the length of time the special session will be in session will depend on the progress made in the senate where the only real opposition to a primary is expected, and where those opposed to such a law believe they will be successful. The house is expected to pass one without little trouble, as it has already gone on record in favor of one by a large majority.

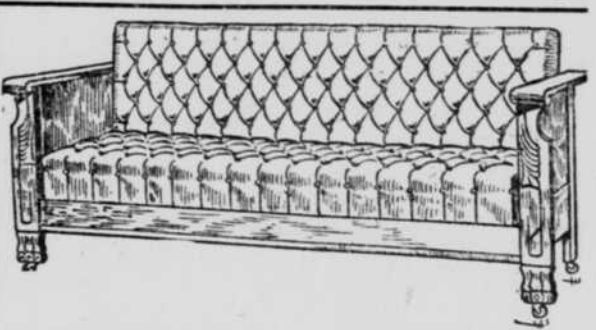

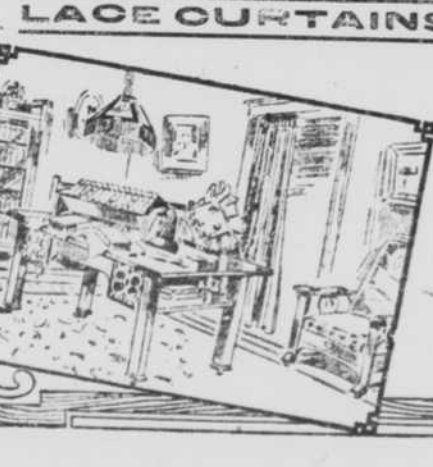

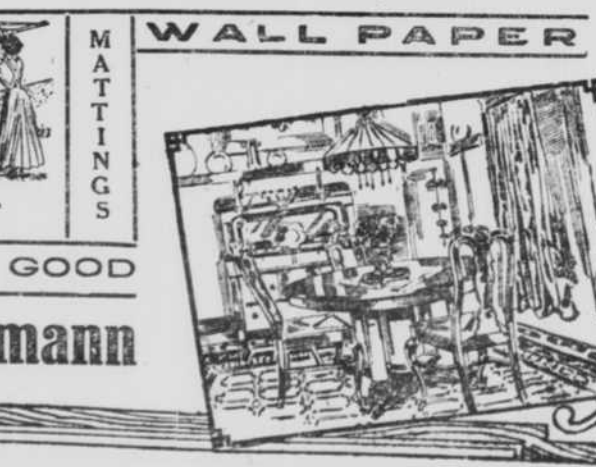
