IS HE DEAD?

The Mysterious Disappearance of Frank E. Kimmins. THE MAN CAME TO WHEELING From His Home at Dallas, Marshall County, Last Thursday, and Disappeared as Completely as Though Swallowed Up—He Left the Farmers' Home for a Walk, but Never Returned—The Police are at Work.

A strange case of mysterious disappearance in this city has just come to light. On Thursday of last week, Frank E. Kimmins, of Dallas, out in Marshall county, came to Wheeling and registered at the Farmers' Home, in the upper Market square. He was assigned a room at the hotel. About 9 o'clock he left the hotel for a stroll about town, and that is the last that has been seen or heard of him. The police have been at work on the case, but so far nothing has developed that would lead to a clue. Kimmins has disappeared as completely as though he had stepped into the Ohio—where so many cases of disappearance have been finally cleared up. The young man's father is in the city, doing all in his power to aid the police in their efforts to learn of the man's movements after he started on that stroll. He does not believe that his son committed suicide, for he was in good health and had plenty of money. His wife had been ill recently, however, and one theory is that young Kimmins brooded over his wife's misfortune and in his wanderings walked into the river and was drowned. This, of course, is merely conjecture, without a fact to back it up. Another theory is that Kimmins was the victim of foul play; this theory, too, is entirely without foundation, so far as all evidence tending to show anything of the kind is concerned. Kimmins has been engaged in the business of leasing oil lands in Marshall and adjoining counties, and usually carried a goodly sum of money on his person. Perhaps he was assailed by robbers and proved to be troublesome to a customer that a tragedy ensued. The following is a description of the missing man: Height, 5 feet 10 inches; rather slim; weight, about 160 pounds; hair, dark; eyes, brown; mustache, sandy; clothes, black; hat, derby style; wore a mackintosh.

AN ACT OF HEROISM.

Brave Act of the Late Alexander Kennedy at Chihuahua. Speaking of the late Alexander McConnell Kennedy, formerly of Wheeling, a Mexican war veteran, who died recently at Washington, the New York Sun tells of this act of heroism during Scott's triumphant march from Vera Cruz to Mexico City: He was in New Orleans when the Mexican war broke out and promptly enlisted, and was made sergeant of Company G, Third dragoons, in General Worth's brigade. At Chihuahua Sergeant Kennedy was detailed with a detachment of his company as a guard at General Worth's headquarters in the field. While General Worth and General Pillow were in conference the Mexican guns set fire to a powder wagon loaded with packages of cartridges and Kennedy and a comrade jumped into the burning vehicle, and at the imminent peril of their lives, dumped package after package of cartridges covered with a sort of gunny bag that was exceedingly hot to handle without gloves, into a ditch half filled with water, which ran close by, while another comrade turned them over in the water, with his saber. The timely unloading of this wagon probably saved the lives of every man within a radius of six hundred yards, including Generals Pillow and Worth.
