WOMEN ARE IT IN ICELAND

Copenhagen, Oct. 11.—Iceland is a veritable paradise of the woman suffragist, for in that far northern country the fair sex actively participates in all except Parliamentary elections. And the attainment of this privilege "and prerogative," as the determined Icelandic champions of "woman's rights" regard it, is but a matter of little time, for they have succeeded in interesting Bjorn Johnson, the new Minister and editor of Isafold, the principal organ of the territory, in their campaign.

As late as January of last year, a legislative measure accorded to married women in Reykjavik and Halmalfjordur, who pay taxes however slight, the right to municipal ballot and to a seat in council. But as early as 1881, unmarried women and widows of more than twenty-five years, who were self-supporting or householders, were granted the right to vote in parish and town elections.

Woman occupies a foremost place, not only in the history but in the present-day life and accomplishment of Iceland. Manual labor is performed by great numbers of women and a life of idleness and luxury is unknown even to the most prosperous and admittedly aristocratic matrons and belles.

The rigor of the climate and the unyielding character of the soil render the entire population one of great resourcefulness; hence, constant labor and industry are the lot of a major number of the women.

Despite these drawbacks, however, culture and education prevail among the fair sex and many societies exist among them or study and research.

Women physicians are very common throughout the island, they having prepared for practice in the schools and colleges with male students.
