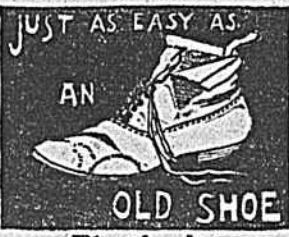

FOR THE JUBILEE

At "the Mount" the Sisters are Making Preparations

ON A MOST ELABORATE SCALE

ALREADY SOME OF THE ALUMNAE ARE ARRIVING IN THE CITY TO ATTEND THE JUBILEE EXERCISES—MRS. MARTINELLI AND ARCHBISHOP KAIN ARE EXPECTED TO ARRIVE TO-DAY. THE PROGRAMME BEGINS ON TUESDAY MORNING.

The Sisters of "The Mount" are just finishing their elaborate preparations for the entertainment of the large number of guests who will be here this week to attend the Jubilee of the Mount de Chantal Academy, and it is assured that they will entertain their former pupils in a manner that will cause the Jubilee to be held in warm remembrance.

Already a number of the alumnae of the institution have arrived for the week. Among Saturday's arrivals were the Misses Klerney, of Weston, the Misses Vronnon, of New York city; Miss Gannon, of McKeesport; Miss O'Brien, of Toronto, O.; Miss Margaret Sullen, of Lock Haven, Pa.; Miss Agnes Deek, of Canton, O., and Mrs. Mary Brabson Littleton, of Washington City.

Among Sunday's arrivals were Mrs. James Sechtig, and daughter, Miss Anna, of Baltimore; Mrs. Patterson and Mrs. Bukey, of Washington, D. C.; Miss Cora Burns and Miss Theresa Munhall, of Pittsburgh, and Miss Magdalena Anderson, of Altoona, Pa.

The interior of the school buildings have been beautifully decorated for the occasion, and will form a revelation to those who attend this week's function.

It is expected that Mgr. Martinelli, the papal delegate in America, will arrive at "The Mount" from Washington City this afternoon. Father McBride, of the Cathedral, went to Washington to meet the noted clergyman, and will accompany him to Wheeling. Archbishop Kain, formerly bishop of Wheeling, will probably arrive from St. Louis to-night. Both will take part in the religious portion of the Jubilee programme, which in whole is as follows:

Alumnae Day. Meeting of the Alumnae, 10 a. m. Address by Rev. Joseph Stenger. Alumnae Banquet, 5 p. m.

STEPHEN MCCULLOUGH DEAD.

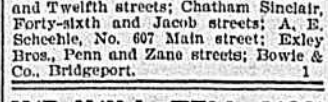
