MINE GUARDS

INJURIES

Prove Fatal to a Small Boy Who Was Struck by a Train.

Tony Scorchuck, aged six years, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Scorchuck, died at 9 o'clock Thursday night in a local hospital from injuries received Thursday morning when he was struck by a freight train near his home at the Columbia mine addition. Scorchuck with several other small children were playing near the track and in some manner he got too close to a passing train and was struck by a car and knocked under the train. He was taken to a hospital but death relieved his sufferings last evening. The funeral will be held at the church of the Holy Rosary Saturday morning at 10 o'clock and the burial will follow in the Holy Cross cemetery.

COURTS

Of Domestic Relations is Urged by Conley at Conference Today.

CLEVELAND, O., June 14.—The imprisonment of wife deserters or husbands charged with non-support is simply legalized and enforced family desertion, unless the convicted husband is placed at hard labor and the proceeds of his labor turned over by the municipality or the state for the support of his family, said Edwin J. Conley, probation officer of the supreme and county courts of Buffalo, in an address before the National Conference of Charities and Corrections here this morning. The speaker argued in favor of the establishment of court of domestic relations as distinct from criminal courts, and the treatment of offenders of this class by probationary methods rather than commitment to jails and prisons.

"Such courts could and would upon their own initiative and through the probation officers," said Mr. Conley, "get in close touch with all the agencies of the community which make for constructive, preventive work. If it be true that these non-support and desertion problems involve the happiness of the family and the future welfare of the children both morally and materially, as well as the economic interests of the community, a persistent effort must be made to utilize to the full the church, the charity organizations, public agencies caring for dependent children, playground associations, settlements, the library, and the other agencies in the community that can help. Some conservative use of these forces under careful direction and supervision will hasten the time when courts involving domestic relations will take a justifiable pride in the number of families they have kept out of court rather than the number of cases on their dockets."
