

ANTI-BEER BILL PASSES THE SENATE; COURT ATTACK COMING

Washington, Nov. 18.—The beer bill, which has been passed by the Senate by a vote of 54 to 22, today passed the conference report on the anti-beer bill.

With legislative action concluded, the bill, fought over for months, now goes to the president, who is expected to sign it within a few days. It was thought possible, however, that there might be a few days delay while an opinion as to the constitutionality of the measure was received from the attorney general.

Until the president's action on the bill, the manufacture and sale by physicians' prescriptions will continue, the treasury department announced, but in all quarters the lease on life for medicinal beer was not placed beyond ten days, although the beer has not been sold only a few weeks ago with the passage of the treasury bill regulations.

Only an hour's debate of extraordinary character, preceded the Senate vote today. Prohibition advocates and opponents clashed sharply during the final session, headed by members of the House. The bill's opponents included twelve Republicans and ten Democrats, while thirty-three Republicans and twenty-three Democrats supported the measure.

Enactment of the bill, whose constitutionality has been questioned in the Senate as an extension of the prohibition amendment in its ban upon beer as an alleged medicinal and not a beverage, was held to be a constitutional carry a test case to the Supreme Court.

Besides prohibiting beer with more than one-half percent of alcohol, the bill would reduce the amount of wine which physicians might prescribe.

The Republican opponents were Senators Brandegee, Davenport, Edce, Johnson, La Follette, Leder, McLean, Penrose, Phipps, Shortridge, Wadsworth and Weller. The Democrats were Senators Bannard, Gerry, King, Pennington, Ransford, Sweeney, Underhill, Walsh, Massachusetts and Watson (Georgia).

Two other Senators, Reed, Democrat Missouri, and Moses, Republican New Hampshire, were paired against the bill. Thirty-three Republicans and 23 Democrats supported the measure, while 12 were absent and 12 were paired.

Albert Delguzo Victim of Tragic Accident at Clifton Mine on Ohio Side

Albert Delguzo, a coal miner 40 years of age, was instantly killed late yesterday afternoon at the Clifton mine of the Central Coal Mining company, located on the Ohio side of the river across from Moundsville.

Delguzo was engaged in coupling coal cars when one gave way, catching him between the car and the rib of the mine. He was badly crushed about the chest and death was almost instantaneous. The body was taken to the Myers morgue at Bellairs, where coroner Hardesty, of Bridgeport, will hold an inquest today.

General arrangements have been made for the funeral. Delguzo was unmarried.

CHILD KILLED BY GOAL CAR

ANNA BOICI, TWO YEARS OLD, DIES INSTANTLY WHEN RUN OVER BELOW BELLAIRE

Was Playing Along Track When Sleeve Became Caught in Car Wheel.

Anna, the little two-year-old daughter of Frank Boici of Big Run, six miles south of Bellaire, was instantly killed yesterday afternoon when run over by a railroad car loaded with coal. The accident happened at the Pennsylvania switch at the Ball and River mine No. 3, at Big Run.

The child, with two other small children, was playing along the track where cars loaded with coal were being moved. In some manner her sleeve became caught in the wheel of a passing car, throwing her head under another wheel. Before the car could be stopped, the wheel passed over the child, severing her head completely from the body.

The body was removed to the Myers morgue at Bellairs, where coroner Clyde Hardesty will hold an inquest today. No funeral arrangements have yet been made.

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GET TWO FOR FALSE ALARM

PAUL BOMBENBERGER AND BERNARD GALLAGHER TO BE IN POLICE COURT THIS MORNING

Had Been Drinking and Were at the Corner When Alarm Was Turned In.

Paul Bombenberger and Bernard "Red" Gallagher will be arraigned before Judge John S. Ritz in police court this morning charged with turning in a false alarm of fire at 10:15 p.m. Friday morning. For the second time in one night, firemen turned out at 3 o'clock yesterday morning and made a run to Chapline and Twenty-third streets, answering an alarm from Box 45.

Arriving at the scene of the alarm, Chief A. Burley Thompson, and his men found that they had made another useless run.

Detective "Chip" Crumbacker and several uniformed policemen were quickly on the scene, and in a short while "Red" Gallagher was in custody and said that Paul Bombenberger had pulled the alarm box.

Both boys were taken to police headquarters later yesterday and charged of turning in a false alarm was placed against both of them.

Had Ordered Them On.

Detective Crumbacker stated that he had ordered Gallagher and Bombenberger, both of whom he said appeared to have been drinking, to go home Friday morning, and that he stood and watched them as they walked up Twenty-third street on their way home. The young men, he says, stopped at the corner of Twenty-third and Chapline, where the alarm box is located, and while he was watching to see if they went on, the alarm began sounding. The detective and patrolman William Horstmann rushed to that point, but Gallagher and Bombenberger had made their temporary getaway. It was an easy matter, however, to round them up.
