

NEW YORK AGAIN HONORS FOCH WITH SERIES OF FUNCTIONS

New York, Nov. 18.—A third marshal of France stole away to rest tonight, long before New York's bedtime, terminating the first hectic day of a three-day visit to America's largest city.

The high spot in his day was his reception by New York school children at the Seventh Regiment armory where about five hundred girls presented a pageant, "The Gifts of the Nations."

From the armory Marshal Foch went to the statue of Jeanne D'Arc on Riverside Drive, where he placed a wreath, then on to Grant's tomb, where, lighted on his way down into the crypt by wax tapers, borne by survivors of Grant's army, he placed a wreath on the sarcophagus.

A battery on the New York University campus barked a salute of nineteen guns as he arrived to present to the university on behalf of the French government a cannon captured in the war.

After the presentation Marshal Foch donned a cap and gown, and marched in a procession to the auditorium of the Hall of Fame, where the degree of doctor of laws was conferred upon him by Chancellor Brown.

He returned to the Knottz home for a brief rest before going on to the dinner of the American Iron and Steel Institute, which ended the first day's program.

He insisted on sacrificing a part of his rest hour, however, to make an unscheduled stop at the convent and academy of the Sacred Heart, where a score of nuns and several hundred pupils were waiting to get a glimpse of him.

TORNADO WRECKS ARKANSAS HOME; EIGHT INMATES DIE

DISASTROUS STORMS STRIKE IN WIDELY SEPARATED PARTS OF ARKANSAS.

FAMILY OF EIGHT WIPED OUT NEAR MENA—HEAVY PROPERTY DAMAGE REPORTED.

Mena, Ark., Nov. 18.—Eight persons in the home of Robert H. Weems, near Wikes, a small town twenty-five miles south of here, were killed last night when a tornado wrecked the house.

The dead are Mrs. Robert Weems, her daughter, Mrs. Mattie Deltz and the Misses Korren, Bala and Verda Weems, her son, Warner Weems, aged 21, and Hawley Deltz, brother-in-law of Mrs. Deltz.

The body of Miss Vera Weems was found in a patch of woods but a mile from the wrecked house. Robert Weems was at Wikes when the storm struck, and discovered the fate of his family and home when he went there after the wind subsided. He notified neighbors and searchers worked all night before all of the victims were found.

Damage was not general in the community, the storm seemingly having struck only in the immediate vicinity of the Weems home.

Wild Talk By Pomerene in the Newberry Case

Washington, Nov. 18.—Declaration by Senator Pomerene, Democrat, Ohio, that he would resign if evidence such as that submitted against Senator Newberry were added against him, marked further consideration by the senate today of Henry Ford's contest of Mr. Newberry's seat as senator from Michigan.

"If I stood here with such evidence against me, I would resign from the senate at once," said Mr. Pomerene.

Asked by Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana, what his action would be if he had violated no laws, the Ohio senator replied:

"If I were innocent, I'd fight the battle of my life. For my rights I would not remain silent."

Mr. Pomerene charged that majority senate elections committee, presided over by Senator Spencer, Republican, Missouri, had blocked all efforts to gather pertinent testimony in its investigation of the case.

Much of the time today was taken up with argument over legal phases of alleged activities of the Newberry campaign committee as brought out in the senate investigation.

Walker as United States district attorney for the northern district of West Virginia, effective December 1, held a conference today with Attorney Walker and his assistant, Harry H. Byrer. Routine work of the office was discussed.

District Attorney Brown announced that he had arranged to have Mr. Bryer remain in office as far as his personal interests were concerned, until the new staff becomes familiar with the work. The new district attorney said that he had not yet named his two assistants.

Attorney Brown left for his home at Parkersburg tonight, where he said, he will establish his headquarters on December 1.

ANOTHER EFFORT TO PREVENT BOND SALE

Morgantown, W. Va., Nov. 18.—The proposed sale of \$225,000 in bonds of the Morgantown & Wheeling railroad by the Monongalia county court to Samuel Pursglove for 50 cents on the dollar, which was enjoined by the circuit court on petition of R. H. Jarvis, as a local taxpayer, and which injunction was withdrawn when it was agreed that the bonds could be sold at public sale next Monday, promises to be further complicated by the announcement tonight that Manning Strick, of New York, president of the corporation which owns more than half the common stock in the company, would ask another injunction at once to stop the sale.

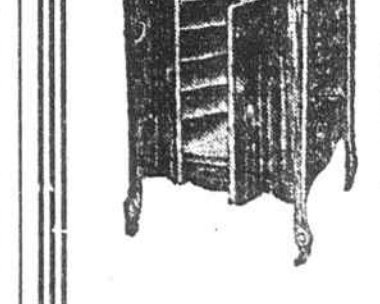
