

INTEREST CENTERS IN FINDINGS OF CLERK ON RECALL PETITIONS

RUMORED THAT ABOUT 3,000 OF NAMES ON ORIGINAL PETITION WILL COME OFF

LANE WILL MAKE NO COMMENT UNTIL HE HAS EXAMINED PETITIONS

With the clerk, late Saturday, of amended petitions for the recall of the eleven members of city council and city manager Homer A. Craig, interest now centers in the coming report of city clerk W. L. Lane as to the sufficiency of insufficiency of the amended petition. Under the city charter, the clerk has ten days in which to examine the amended petitions before making up his final certificate on the petitions to be presented to city council.

In the neighborhood of 1,000 more names of voters accompanied the amended petitions when they were returned to the city clerk at four o'clock Saturday afternoon. The names were returned by Attorney S. M. Noyes, chairman of the recall committee. Noyes claims will meet the objection on this were not in proper form.

In his next petition to council concerning the recall petitions, City Clerk Lane stated that he had applications from 1,000 voters to have their names stricken from the petitions. The recall committee points estimate that more than 400.

Much interest attaches to the second paragraph of City Clerk Lane's first certificate, which refers to the 1,000 requests for removal of names and "other irregularities" with which the clerk stated he could deal when the petitions were in proper form. It has been persistently rumored that the clerk will hold that about 2,000 of the names signed to the original petition would come off, 1,000 by request of the signers and the majority of the remaining 2,000 because it is claimed they were signed by persons other than the voters of the names in question.

However, City Clerk Lane, as yet, will make absolutely no comment as to what his finding will be, and declares that he will not make any statement until he and City Solicitor J. H. Brennan have gone over the amended petitions thoroughly.

FREED OF CHARGE OF FALSE ALARM

In police court Saturday, Bernard Gallagher and Paul Bonenberger, pleaded guilty to charges of being intoxicated and were fined \$1 and costs each. The two young men were charged by Detective "Chip" Crumbacker with turning in a false alarm of fire Friday morning from the alarm box at Chapline and Twenty-third streets. Each denied pulling the box, and Judge John S. Ritz dismissed this charge, with a severe warning as to the consequence of turning in false alarms. Detective Crumbacker was unable to state positively that either young man pulled the alarm, although he said he was watching them on the box, after he had ordered them off the street and saw them halt at the corner of Chapline and Twenty-third streets just before the alarm began hitting in. In face of this testimony, the judge, after a brief deliberation, decided that he had pulled the alarm and each of the young men alibied for the other.

Stabley Sukz, Charles Nickson and Harry Sobolka were fined \$5 each for being disorderly in the Lyceum theatre. Sobolka was fined \$10 and costs with the alternative of sixty days in jail, on a vagrancy charge.

OLD STONE CHURCH BEING TORN DOWN

The work of tearing down the Old Stone church at Elm Grove has been started, and soon there will be no trace left of the edifice which has been the place of worship for Presbyterians in that locality for more than a century and a quarter.

The building is being dismantled, the wood work first, and the work of tearing down the walls will follow. The stone from the building will be used to construct a handsome entrance to the Stone Church cemetery.

HABIG'S ASSAILANT HAS NEW COUNSEL

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In criminal court Saturday Attorney W. L. Bradshaw notified Judge Alan H. Robinson that he had withdrawn as counsel for Frank Ervin of North Bendwood, who is charged with feloniously shooting ex-councilman Ambrose E. Habig. Judge Robinson appointed Police Judge John S. Ritz as counsel for Ervin, and the case was passed to December 3, when argument on a demurrer to the indictment will be heard.

Judge Robinson continued until November 26, the case of Jeanette Johnson, charged with George Traylor, with shoplifting. The case against R. H. Nagle, accused of passing bad checks, was continued to December 3. Ben Frazee and Howard Bowman, charged with highway robbery, secured continuance on their case until December 3. The case of James Gilligan, indicted on a non-support charge, was passed to November 26. Trial of Robert Fagan of Pittsburgh, charged with violating the Yost law, was set for Friday, November 25, when Prosecutor Carl Bachmann told the court he had investigated and found that Fagan was at work on a day recently when a certificate presented in court said the defendant was too ill to appear. Trial of Jack Malino, charged with theft of an automobile, was set for Friday, December 2. A warrant charging James Deters with violating the liquor law was quashed on the ground that the charge contained therein was vague and indefinite.

Following the quashing of the Deters warrant, Judge Robinson instructed Prosecutor Bachmann to draft a letter to exercise more care to conform to the statute in the drawing up of warrants in criminal cases brought into the courts.

James Harper, a Second ward negro, arrested Saturday by Federal Prohibition Officer Tom Arrington, was remanded to jail to await a hearing on a charge of pistol toting preferred by Police Officer James O'Keefe. Arrington charged Harper with having in his possession illegally two pints of liquor.

John Calvero on Saturday purchased a sheriff's sale the auto truck which was confiscated when Calvero was captured transporting liquor through Ohio county. It cost him \$225 to get the truck back again.

Charles Hubler, who gives his residence as Pittsburgh, was remanded to jail to await a hearing on a charge of living off earnings of his wife, which she claims he forced her to secure in houses of ill fame. Mrs. Hubler had officer Gehring arrest her husband. He has been informed from Pittsburgh that federal authorities are also seeking Hubler.

Assessor James Richards will begin the reassessment of real estate and personal property in Ohio county Monday, November 28, under instructions from the state tax commissioner.

Police raided No. 2236 Main street and arrested Robert Thornton on a charge of operating a gambling house. Al Noel, Ernest Bailey, John Peacock and Sam Carey will be arraigned in police court charged with gambling in Thornton's place.

More severe punishment for convicted offenders, eternal vigilance by authorities charged with law enforcement, heavier bonds to secure the release of alleged criminals and a united public sentiment in favor of law enforcement are named by Prosecuting Attorney Carl Postmaster W. W. Erwin stated last evening that, with the Christmas season coming on, indications point to an extremely busy season at the local office.

Squire J. W. Kindelberger continued until Saturday, December 3, the case of Mrs. George Minor, who is charged with assaulting Miss Ruth Rice, a Clay school teacher, who it is alleged was beaten up by Mrs. Minor, whose children the teacher had reprimanded. Miss Rice was still unable to appear in justice court as a witness for the prosecution.

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When the County Insanity commission declared Dan Bryer sane, Judge Robinson set Bryer's trial on a charge of assaulting Mrs. Mary Pratz at her home recently, for criminal court for Friday, November 26.

The afternoon session will begin at 1:30 o'clock with an open forum at which time "Satisfactory Shipping Rates" will be discussed by J. J. Steinmetz of Charleston. "Collections This Year" by Harry Gordon of Montgomery. Following this the executive board will go in session which will be followed by the nomination and election of a board of directors. 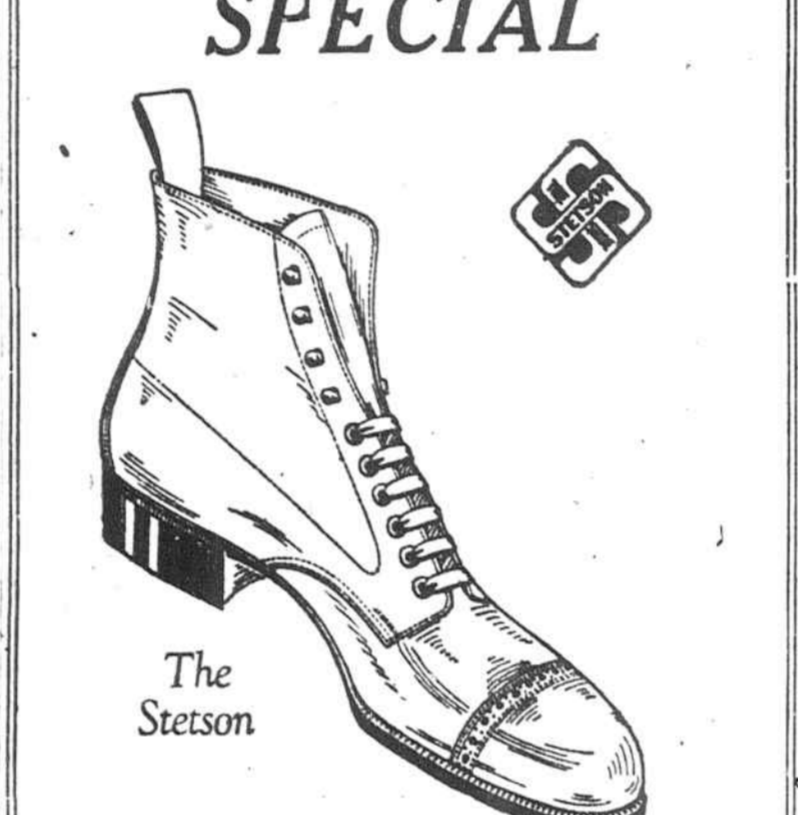

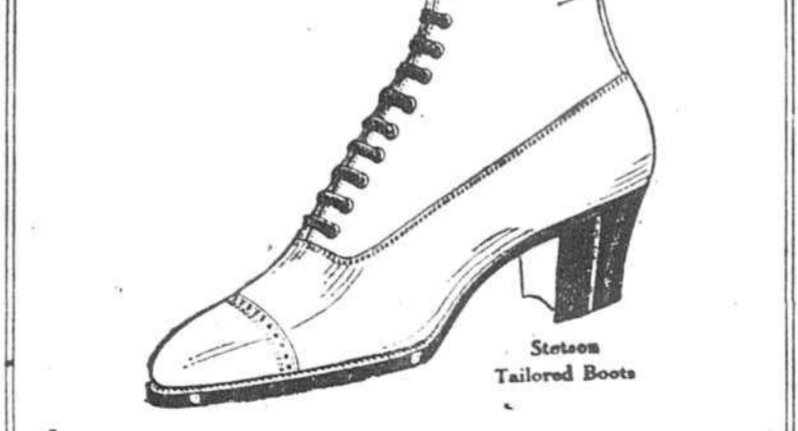
