1884 FLOOD DID SOME DAMAGE HERE

Gleanings From an Issue of the Ceredo Enterprise of 1884.

The following relative to the 1884 flood is taken from the Ceredo Enterprise, Feb. 19, 1884:

Darkness settled down on the stricken town with the water still rising at the rate of about an inch an hour, which it continued to do until ten o'clock Tuesday when anger was assuaged, and the great river, grand even clothed in its terrible majesty, rested as if contemplating the fear and awe it had inspired and the ruin it had wrought.

Accurate measurements on Twelve Pole bar at the hour the highest point was reached, showed 63 feet above the low water of last September and 6 feet 7 inches above the high water of 1883. Marks on a building still standing near A. C. Handley's show the great flood of 1882 was not as high by 5 feet and 4 inches. Sixty-one buildings were submerged in Ceredo when the crisis was reached.

The condition of many families now rendered homeless was such as to ask for aid from some source. * * * In the meantime the Relief Boat Chesapeake with supplies from the Ohio State Relief Fund, touched here and offered such assistance as was necessary to relieve immediate want. Three hundred rations were accepted, and since, the Government Relief Boat Katy Stockdale left supplies of provisions, clothing, bedding, etc, so that there seems to be no immediate or even remote danger of suffering.

LOSSES.

J. H. Millender & Co., loss very heavy. No basis for figures. Over 1,000,000 feet of sawed boards washed from the yards, the larger proportion of which was landed along the river and will be recovered.

CIGARETTE LAW IN EFFECT MAY 22

Those Past Sixteen Years May Use Pipe or Cigar Lawfully.

After May 22, there will be no more cigarette smoking for minors, according to the provisions of a drastic statute which becomes effective on that date. If you are over sixteen years of age, however, you may smoke a pipe or cigar.

Boys who have the "habit" are in many cases preparing for the momentous occasion by resurrecting old forgotten pipes, cleaning them and in general getting ready to abandon the cigarette forever. That the habit is harmful to boys of tender years, is apparently the consensus of opinion of physicians, and for this reason many lads are glad that temptation will be removed by the law which forbids the sale of cigarettes or cigarette tobacco and papers to minors.
