BE SURE YOUR VOTES ARE IN BALLOT BOX IN TIME ON SATURDAY

One day before the end—one more working day—Saturday and then the Great Golden Festival of The West Virginian will be over. Monday will see the hopes of the most industrious turned to realization. The most industrious this last day will be bound to work for the campaign remains so even that those who pull ahead today and Saturday will be the winners.

Be sure to get as much of your final business in today as you possibly can, and avoid the big rush and confusion the last day. While it is true that today will be big day, it is better to have it over, or as much as possible before the last day. Leave the last day for the odds and ends, those few subscriptions that you couldn't secure sooner.

If you live out of town, be sure that you mail your reserve votes in time enough to insure their reaching the contest manager by nine o'clock in the evening Saturday. To be sure, you had better mail them at once. The ballot box is locked and sealed, so your votes can safely be deposited at any time now.

If you have any late subscriptions Saturday, it will be necessary for you to wire the money and the subscribers' names to the contest manager, to insure their being counted. Any votes or late subscriptions that do not reach the contest manager by nine o'clock in the evening Saturday cannot under any circumstances be counted.

In putting in your reserve votes, be sure that you have them all. Look them over thoroughly and be sure you have not misplaced any. You can have a million votes in reserve, and if they

do not get in the ballot box in time for the final count by the judges they will do you no more good than as though you had none at all.

There is nothing further to be added, except—improve every minute and win.

Tomorrow, start turning in your subscriptions just as early in the day as you possibly can. The office will be open from eight o'clock in the morning until nine at night, the hour set for the closing. If you have any business left over from Friday that you didn't turn in, please get it in the contest office just as early in the day as you possibly can. The earlier the better. The contest manager hopes that no one will leave any business for the last minute. It is the desire of the manager to have all the votes issued long before nine o'clock, the closing hour. It is the desire of the manager that everything will be ready for the judges promptly at nine o'clock, so they can start the count early, and not have to wait for the manager to issue a lot of votes for anyone who might come at the closing hour.

If you have nothing to turn in during the closing hours, please do not come, for it will only add to the confusion, and there will be no news of any kind to give out until the final count has been made, so there will be nothing to gain, and you will be helping the contest department greatly.

There will be no information as to winners given out until the Monday edition of The West Virginian.

And now, as the closing hours approach, more than ever in your life, make every minute count. Good luck.

Rules for Closing

1. The Golden Festival will close promptly at nine o'clock in the evening, Saturday, April 14. The closing hour will not be extended for anyone after nine o'clock under any circumstances.
2. No money will be accepted for votes under any circumstances unless accompanied by bona fide subscriptions to The West Virginian, or such length as comply with the rules.
3. No personal checks will be accepted by the Golden Festival Manager in payment for subscriptions on Thursday, Friday or Saturday, the three final days of the Golden Festival days, have them made out to yourself and cash them.
4. Be sure that you have all of your reserve votes in the ballot box not later than nine o'clock in the evening, April 14. If you forget to deposit them before the judges make their final count, nothing can be done to save you.
5. The last count of votes to be made by the Golden Festival Manager will be made Wednesday night of the final week, and the result published in The West Virginian on Thursday afternoon, preceding the closing day. The ballot box will immediately be sealed and locked after this count by
