JUDGE VINCENT OPENS HIS COURT

Several Juvenile Cases Disposed of in Chambers This Morning.

Intermediate court met in its October session this morning with Judge Vincent in chambers. A number of legal matters were disposed of.

In the action of James R. Baker, et al., vs. Henry T. Baker a final report was submitted to the court. A decree of Judge Vincent confirmed the same.

This afternoon at 2 o'clock the docket was read. There are several hundred cases on the list. Fully 100 are criminal cases and as there will be no jury at this time these cases will be disposed of later.

Judge Vincent this morning held a session of juvenile court. In the prosecution of the State vs. Franklin Burroughs, aged 12 years, and Mack Tedesco, aged 14 years, the two boys who broke into the Children shop last night, the trial was set for Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock.
