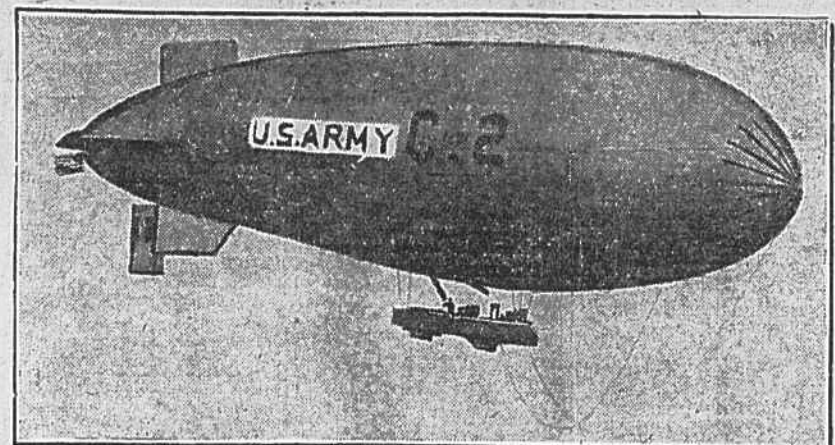

MANY OUTRAGES COMMITTED WITH WOMEN VICTIMS

Girl Pupils in American College Carried Off by Turks.

FIRE HAS PURPOSE

Alleged Turks Used This Means to Cover Up Many Crimes.

(By the Associated Press.)

Massacre of far reaching proportions are reported to have occurred in Smyrna, attending the terrible conflagration which has just swept over the city. The first reports came from Greek sources and estimated the victims as high as 1,000 to 2,000. Later reports from British eye witnesses and from American arriving at Greek ports tended to confirm the massacres and gave harrowing accounts of the extent of the devastation which was wrought.

MINING SCHOOLS START NEXT WEEK

Class in Fairmont Will Be Held Next Friday Night.

Next week the mining extension schools of Northern West Virginia will resume their work. The first class will be held at Mt. Clare on Monday evening and the round of classes will follow at the various points and on the nights that were in effect last year, when the work was begun on a more extensive scale in this section.

Adam Crawford, instructor of five classes in Northern West Virginia states that after making calls at coal company offices he has found more interest in the work than there was last year at the time the course was begun. A number of coal companies have written letters to their superintendents and mine foremen urging them to attend classes at the various points and encourage the miners to do likewise. Mr. Crawford is well pleased with the outlook for the coming year.

Two towns, Wyatt and Grant Town, would like to have classes, but the schedule is filled up. It is said there will be no switch if the smaller classes at Mt. Clare and Carolina take the mark and increase the size of their classes over last year. In both of these towns the interest is keener this year than last because both Mt. Clare and Carolina are anxious to retain their classes.

The schedule for next week will be as follows: Monday evening, Mt. Clare; Tuesday evening, Clarkburg; Wednesday evening, Charleston; Thursday evening, Shinnston; Friday evening, Fairmont. These nights will be retained and classes will be taught for the twenty-six weeks following. The subjects that will be taught will be haulage, drainage, pumpage, explosives, mine fires, explosions and a review on ventilation. No charge is made for the course the expense being borne by the state and the federal government jointly, which is worked out on a proportionate basis. All that is required is a small fee to be deposited to retain the pupil's interest and as a guarantee that he will attend class regularly. This is returned if the percentage of perfect attendance is within the specified percentage.
