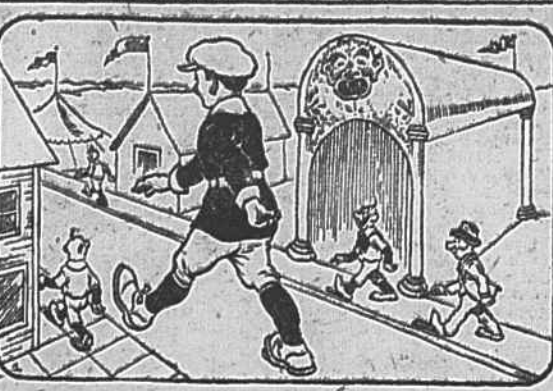

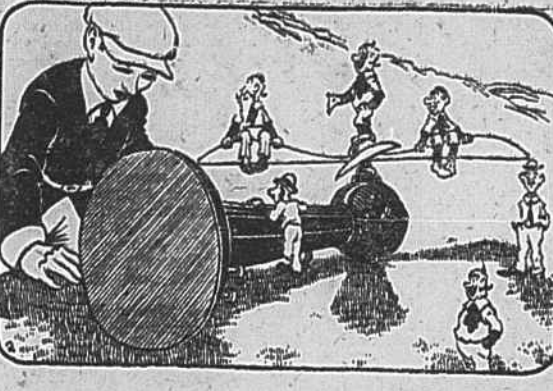
WILL LEAD MEN FORUM MEET
