Duke University Centennial Celebration

Duke University is built round Trinity College, which goes back in its origins to the year 1838-39. In that year a group of Methodists and Quakers in Randolph County, North Carolina, formed an association for the support of a school which they called Union Institute. This institution continued under this name until 1851, when it was reorganized under the name Normal College and was devoted to training teachers for the newly established public school system of the State. Just before the Civil War the College was affiliated with the North Carolina Methodist Conference and reincorporated under the name Trinity College, which continues today as the undergraduate college for men in Duke University. The University was organized in 1924.

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
