The Governors of the Twenty-nine Districts representing the nearly 1,900 clubs of Kiwanis International in the United States and Canada for 1933 are so impressed with this fact that they hereby constitute themselves into an Order of Friendliness. This is done by no authority granted by anyone or any organization, but by virtue of the attainments of the District Governors.

In recognition of the mutual high regard for each other since meeting as District Governors-elect at the Kiwanis International Council held at the Medinah Athletic Club in Chicago, Illinois, November 17, 18, and 19, 1932, the said Governors now organize themselves into a group to be known hereafter as "The Governors of 1933".

Never forgetting the interests of Kiwanis service, which is that of the Golden Rule, the District Governors of 1933 gave unstintingly of their time and effort to promote the objectives of Kiwanis International. These include Service to Underprivileged Children; Intelligent, Aggressive and Serviceable Citizenship; Friendly Understanding between all Citizens, Rural and Urban; Vocational Guidance; and Boys and Girls Work; and special objectives; the Maintenance of Adequate Educational Facilities, especially those making for Character Development and Business-like Methods in Administrative Government, with special application to local government; and the building of New Clubs, increasing Membership and Attendance; and furthering Inter-club Meetings and Fellowship.

In closing the administration, the said District Governors affix their signatures to this charter as a token of the esteem they hold for each other.
